I'm a hedgehog flea, get me out of here!

For those of you who have visited Sidcup by car and found it difficult to get out of the area, spare a thought for the hedgehog population of Sidcup. According to Mavis Righini of Prickles Hedgehog Haven (020 8462 1168), who gave a talk recently to the Erith & Crayford Scout Fellowship, the hedgehogs of Sidcup are the only local hedgehogs who have fleas. Don't panic though as hedgehog fleas only stay on hedgehogs and do not jump onto other beings. The reason is due to the traffic problem and that is because Sidcup is surrounded by major roads. So it's not only the cars that cannot escape but hedgehogs too, and so the flea population lives. I wonder if this is why the road system is as it is?

Mavis gave a wonderful talk on helping hedgehogs and is a member of the British Hedgehog Preservation Society. Some of their aims are to encourage and give advice to the public and to encourage children to respect natural wild-life. The society also funds serious research into behavioural habits of hedgehogs and assist in their survival. Mavis said she would love to talk to any group that are interested young or old, and actually brought a real live hedgehog along with her.
