IN MEMORY OF PETER LAMPON

1927-2008. A founder member of the BCVYO, Peter Lampon died on Christmas Eve 2008 aged 81, after a period of serious illness that not many people really knew about. He worked tirelessly for both the BCVYO and the Bexley District Junior Football League (BJFL) formed in 1973, where he was Vice-Chairman for the years it has existed.

In 1970, Peter formed Parkmere Football Club – for some youngsters who were always playing in the streets near his house. He was still their Chairman when he died.

When the BCVYO was first set up, Peter was there as a representative

on many an occasion. He received an award from the



Football Association recognising 25 years service and in 2004 he received Civic Recognition by the Mayor of Bexley, who will hopefully be attending Peter's funeral.

Peter was a newspaper man working as an editor of The European, a paper printed for the then famous Robert Maxwell. Peter sometimes talked about how Maxwell had ruined his retirement plan, especially when signing your grant cheques. I will personally miss Peter a great deal as he was so supportive in my work at the BCVYO. He would be terribly sad to know of its demise.

LASER SOUTH AFRICA 2008

The last year and a half have been incredible: exciting, busy, emotional, stressful, happy and wonderful. Last May when I applied to 'find out more' about Region International Opportunities, I never imagined that I'd actually be invited to lead a trip, let alone lead a Region trip to help pioneer the Region's Centenary plans in South Africa!

London and South East England Region (LaSER) has formed a partnership with God's Golden Acre, an NGO working in KwaZulu Natal and the 2008 trip was the first phase of the project. The team was made up of 14-18 year old Guides who had been handpicked to be part of the project.

God's Golden Acre (GGA) was founded in 1994 and works in rural areas within the communities of KwaZulu Natal. They provide food, education, clothing and medical care, as well as providing opportunities to those most in need. South African Airways kindly gave us 20kg of free luggage allowance which allowed us to take out everything we needed. We also took an extensive list of simple action songs and parachute games to share with the different children we would meet.

When we finally arrived at God's Golden Acre the excitement was almost unbearable. Volunteers come from all over the world to stay and work at GGA and I felt privileged to be invited. Our time was spent doing a variety of things. We spent late afternoons and evenings with the 70 extraordinary children who live on site who have been orphaned or abandoned as a result of the HIV pandemic and/or violence. Some of them have physical or emotional disabilities, some have been victims of abuse or trauma and so can't be cared for in their communities.

The children at GGA are often referred to as the 'Khayelihle Kids'. They are put into foster families with several adults acting as parents or careers. Each cluster foster family has a Gogo (Grandmother), Aunties and a House Parent who is responsible for overseeing the general care, welfare and education of each of the children in the family. The children are encouraged to maintain connections with their Zulu roots. They eat traditional Zulu foods and communicate in their native language. They are disciplined in the same

ways they would be if they lived with their families in the valleys of KwaZulu Natal.

The aim of the Houses of Hope project is to build homes for orphaned families and upgrade homes that are simply not habitable. We were driven into one of the valleys nearby and shown one of the sites that the GGA Building Team was currently working on. The home belonged to a grandmother and her eight grandchildren, whom she cared for on her own. The Rondavel (round circular hut) they were living in, was poorly made. The walls were made of clay type mud and wooden branches and the roof was simply corrugated iron. It was falling apart. During the rain the roof would leak and we were told there were strong possibilities of collapse as it just wasn't structurally safe.

When we visited the next House of Hope we were able to get more involved and actually help to finish it off, ready for a family to move into the following week. The house belonged to one of the first young girls that GGA had helped and had been burnt out by members of the local community. The mother of the family was dying of TB and so the children were being cared for by their elderly grandmother. We painted the house inside and out and the family moved in shortly after we left.

As well as sightseeing we spent time visiting different Guiding units. We ran activities with Teddies, Brownies, Guides and Rangers as well as playing games. We visited three very different Guide units in South Africa but despite the obvious differences between them, all of the girls and Guiders were very proud to be part of such a huge organisation. I look back and I'm so happy that I was part of the beginning of such an exciting, worthwhile project. I'm proud to say I was part of the first stage of the LaSER and GGA Centenary project. Seeing the girls grow as individuals and as a team over the last 18 months has been immensely rewarding and has made all of the hard work and time involved in such a big trip worth it. To be doing the right thing as an individual was great but to be doing the right thing as part of a dedicated and enthusiastic team on behalf of so many others in Guiding was an incredibly amazing feeling.

Air Cadet George Wootten (17) has just completed a life long ambition to learn to fly, by completing the inaugural flying scholarship of the East Wickham and Welling War Memorial Trust (WMT).

Former Mayor of Bexley, Councillor Nigel Betts was instrumental in the modern foundation of the trust for the ongoing preservation of the memory of those East Wickham and Welling residents who gave their lives in the service of their country in the Great War, and in subsequent conflicts. They fund a Welling Air Cadet, to undertake the scholarship to preserve the link between the modern youth and the Royal Flying Corps.

Completed at the Air Cadet's flying school at Dundee, George went solo in under nine hours training. He was able fly around Ben Nevis the largest mountain in the British Isles, and said: "Thank you for making a dream come true. I thoroughly enjoyed it, although the last solo had gusting winds, making the landing difficult."

Thankfully he successfully landed, and is now using Welling squadrons flight simulators to put his experience and knowledge to good use, by instructing junior cadets in flying. Squadron training officer Flight Lieutenant (Flt Lt) Dave Hill said:

"The annual flying scholarship that the WMT has instigated, for those air cadets who live in Welling, will allow cadets like George to fulfill their aspirations to fly, but who for various reasons would never be selected through the normal Air Cadet selection processes."
